FIRST (For Inspiration and Recognition of Science and Technology) was founded in 1989 to inspire young people's interest and participation in science and technology, and Harris RF has a long history of supporting our local FIRST Robotics teams. The employees listed below are part of a team that works year round, collectively donating **thousands** of hours of their personal time. This past year, they mentored **36 high school students**. Five of the six seniors on the team will be going to college and majoring in a technical field. Overall, of the 51 Penfield graduates who have participated in the FIRST program, 48 have gone on to college and 37 of those have entered a technical field.

These are just a sample of the many activities our FIRST mentors organized this year: 3 Intervol visits to sort medical supplies for third world nations; 2 Penfield FIRST Lego League Camps; Monroe County Legislature Meeting; Penfield Clean-up Day; Small Business Counsel Thanksgiving Basket Drive; Barktober Fest at the Lollypop Farm; Simon Electronics Trade Show Demonstration; Light the Night Walk to benefit the Leukemia and Lymphoma Society; Hosted a Red Cross Blood Drive.
